How it works: The Buy Nothing Project is a global collection of community-based groups that focus on neighbors giving away goods and services. The main rule is that everything is free! From outgrown winter coats to kitchen appliances to extra garden vegetables, you can offer, accept, and request all sorts of free things from friendly neighbors. There are two Buy Nothing Arlington Heights groups—one for the South side of town, one for the North side. You simply request to join the Facebook group; you may be asked to provide your address so group administrators know you are in the right area.
